

Worshiping "Together" for the next few weeks

And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old." (Matthew 13:52)

In this verse, Jesus is talking about parables with his disciples (in the Gospel of Matthew, the disciples seem to have to have a lot more explained to them). But I think that it's instructive for us as well—we take Jesus' parables as a given. We speak and teach and learn in metaphors all the time. But we are constantly living in new realities as well, and we face new challenges in being able to live out our commitment to the Kingdom of God, which is God's constant in our lives.

Some of you may have a memory of different and wide-spread infections that have raced across the globe. Most of us won't remember the Spanish flu (but may have heard family stories about it), but many will remember the polio outbreaks of the 40s and 50s. There have been much smaller scale outbreaks across the globe, but COVID-19 seems to be a different "new" virus and on a scale that we haven't seen recently. We are justly and rightly trying to slow down the spread of this, and as such we will not be meeting for worship in person for the foreseeable future.

This makes me sad because we believe that being "in person" is a large part of why God became human and dwelt among us. Having been a part of virtual environments, I know that it easy to become "disembodied"—in other words, to forget that our bodies mean something to God. That's why in person worship is so important to make a priority. But for right now, that priority could endanger many of us and many who are around us. And so we adapt.

There are three ways to stay connected to worship that we will be offering:

Completely online through Facebook live (it didn't work on March 15, but we hope to be fully up and running by March 22). Simply go to the church's facebook page! I hope to incorporate music and opportunities for full participation as well as a chance to submit prayer requests. We are looking to churches that have a lot of tech capability to let us know what we can reasonably do, but this is also an opportunity for us to reach out to folks who may want to dip their toe in the water of a relationship with Jesus and with us.

Through a bi-weekly or weekly mailout of worship materials. This is a good option if you don't have access to the internet. We intend to include a devotion, a copy of the scripture and words to hymns as well as prayers. If you would like to do this, please fill out the form on the back of this newsletter or call the church and leave a message on our general line.

A hybrid of both. Maybe you're not on facebook or just don't have the capability of doing that because of less access to internet services. Each week, we will send out either a copy of the sermon or a video of Pastor Cynthia giving it, some links to youtube videos of Daniel playing hymns (with the words in the "see more" section so that you can sing along!) and an order of worship.

We don't know when we will hit our peak of exposure to this virus. Right now as I write this, gatherings of over 250 people (either public or private) have been suspended through May 1 in Austin, and the Center for Disease Control is recommending groups of 50 or more (10 or more if most of the people are over 60) suspend all gettogethers for the next 8 weeks.

While you may think this is an exaggeration, please know that when things spread exponentially, it can mean that we double or triple the number of people who contract this virus every single day. In Austin, there are 6 known positive cases. That could mean that by next week at this time, there could be 384 cases (if it simply doubled) and by the week following there could be over 49,000 (again, just doubling).

But like Noah kept sending out birds to check and see if there was dry land, we'll keep sending out messages of hope and counting on God to provide a sign that it is safe to gather again. In the meantime, we will continue our Wilderness Lenten journey AND look forward to the promise of resurrection which is always true, whether it arrives according to our calendar or not!

ATX CROP Hunger Walk Tops 2019 Total

First, thank you, Memorial UMC, for your support of the 2020 CROP Hunger Walk. The fact that you had walkers

warms my heart – so this is as much a personal thank you as it is an official expression of gratitude on behalf of the Walk organizers and CWS!

As of today, we know that the Walk will exceed the 2019 total of \$68,300. We will top \$70,000 and possibly exceed \$71,000! Numbers, of course, are just that – numbers. Each of those dollars represents food on a family table; a community garden; an animal that changes a family's life – a pig, chicken, and goat. Each of those dollars represents love and caring by people like you!

I do want to say a word about the hottest topic around: COVID-19. CWS has been monitoring the spread of this virus globally. We have staff who are in affected countries. In the U.S., Spring CROP Hunger Walks are already being impacted. The Durham, NC Walk venue is Duke University – one of the largest walks in the nation. Duke has made a prudent decision to stop any large gatherings on campus. What we do know at this time is local groups – Food Banks, church pantries, community gardens, small scale farming efforts – will be impacted. "Local" means our own Central Texas Food Bank, Casa Marianella, Hope Food Pantry, Urban Roots, iACT for Refugees, Micah 6 and Mt. Olive Food Pantry. Local also means a family awaiting clean water in West Timor; a refugee family in Cairo in need of a voucher for food. In the end, it's all local. As a United Methodist, I return again and again to John Wesley: The world is my (our) parish.

Giving options while church is not meeting "in-person".

Continuing to support the church as ministries move online and into the virtual realm is something that all of us are paying attention to now! Many folks in our congregation have not chosen to take advantage of our online giving portal, but other than sending a check to the church through the mail (always a valid option!), online giving can be a helpful way to send donations to the church. We have two options for online giving right now—credit card or bank account draw. None of your account information is saved (unless you click the recurring donation button), and this is a secure way to give.

If you aren't sure how this works, here are some images of what happens when you click on the online giving portal (a little ways down the front page of the website): Basically, you input the amount you would like to give (don't worry about the add donation button—it just gives you an extra box for a second donation). Then select whether you'd like to give through a credit card or directly from the bank account. Then input that information and you're all set!







Suggestions for you and your family—

- Each week during a time of worship, take time to actually either prepare a letter to mail with a pledge or gift or to go online
- Continue to make use of offertory prayers or scriptures that remind us to be generous as we are able. Some websites that have prayers are:

Right now, child care is considered a semiessential service to provide in the community, so the Wesley School is remaining open, under the guidance of both the CDC and the Texas Department of Human Health and Services, who have issued strict guidelines for the continued running of the school.

Please know that even before these guidelines were issued, the school was taking every precaution, mandating frequent handwashing beyond what they normally do and daily sanitization of various areas. Sometimes the teachers are even coming up on weekends to make sure they have the best knowledge and their classrooms are clean. They have indefinitely postponed their spring fundraiser

We do envision a time when the state of Texas or the city of Austin may need to close even these areas, so we are preparing for that. We hope you will keep the Wesley staff, kids and families in your prayers.
