and Florence Robinson Morrison. He passed away July 2, 2021.

Donald graduated from in 1944 and was drafted into the Army. He went to Camp Wheeler in Georgia for training. While enlisted he sailed from Camp Miles Standish. The trip took 11 days in rough seas. He landed in Scotland and traveled via train to Southampton, England, crossed English Channel to Le Havre, France. From there they traveled via truck (feet became frostbitten on trip) to Northeastern Belgium near the Rhine River. Donald was assigned to 2nd Infantry Division in heavy weapons platoon. On the German side of the Rhine River, he was hit by shrapnel in the face and left breast pocket. A New Testament bible in that pocket stopped the shrapnel. He was left for dead because of the blood on his face and the hole in his left breast pocket of his field jacket. When he came to, he remembered the route they were to have taken, and he made his way to the camp. He was awarded the Purple Heart on March 23, 1945. Upon landing he was sent to Camp Swift in Bastrop, TX. While on leave he got married to Betty Jean White on Wednesday, August 8, 1945 in Sharon, WI. Betty

joined him in December 1945. He received orders to Camp McCoy in Wisconsin in April 1946. Donald was Honorably Discharged in 1946

Donald and Betty lived in Sharon, WI and Belvidere, IL before moving to Austin, Texas in June of 1970, where he retired from Travis County Appraisal District after 17+ years. They joined the Memorial United Methodist Church in Austin, TX on August 9, 1970. He has served in numerous positions over 50 years. He enjoyed dancing all his life. He and Betty danced together for more than 45 years until her death in 1991. He also enjoyed dancing with his best friend and companion, Lora Janda. He loved to travel and especially enjoyed the trip to Czechoslovakia in 2005 with Lora. Donald also loved to swim at the downtown Austin YMCA. (He learned to swim there after the age of 67 and has many friends there.)

He moved into the Buckner Greenridge Independent Living community and spent four wonderful years there. Donald was a lifetime fan of the Chicago Cubs and the Green Bay Packers. He drove his own car until 3 weeks before his passing.

We want to thank the staff at Baylor Scott & White Hospital – Round Rock for taking care of him. He was discharged to the Family Tree Assisted Living with Hospice. The care team there was absolutely wonderful in his last few days.

Donald was preceded in death by his wife Betty White Morrison, father Donald A Morrison, mother Florence Robinson Morrison, sister Rosella Morrison Christenson, brother Gaylord Lee Morrison, great-granddaughter Payton Noelle Sturges, friend & companion Lora Jean Janda. He is survived by his daughters Karan Ackerman (late Frank Hinds) of Horseshoe Bay, TX, Linda (Pete) Sturges of Rockford, IL, Bonita Reininger (late Mike Reininger) of Waxahachie, TX; Son Jeffrey (Dana) Morrison of Georgetown, TX; 8 grandchildren, 12 great-greatgrandchildren, brothers Allen (Dorothy) Morrison of Sharon, WI and Harold (Sandy) Morrison of Darlington, WI; Sister-in-law Alma (late Gaylord) Morrison of South Beloit, IL. He was PeePaw Don to 16 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren of late companion Lora Janda; a very close family friend, Christine Jones of Bend, OR; numerous cousins, nieces, nephews and many other family members, extended family members and friends who loved him dearly.

The UMW bible study group enjoyed table fellowship after the July 13 meeting at The Little Deli.

"Thus says the LORD of hosts: Old men and old women shall again sit in the streets of Jerusalem, each with staff in hand because of their great age. And the streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in its streets. Thus says the LORD of hosts: Even though it seems impossible to the remnant of this people in these days, should it also seem impossible to me, says the LORD of hosts?" (Zechariah 8:4-6)

Most of my experience with reading the minor prophets has given me the overall sense that they were a cautious bunch, warning Judah and Israel about their sins and about the ways in which they were not taking care of one another. And they are (just try reading Amos!).

But every once in awhile, the prophets come out with glorious visions of how it will be in some indefinite future when the people are once again choosing to live in communion with God and with the earth and with one another.

This vision of boys and girls playing causes me to wonder what kinds of games and pastimes kids in those days had. We're in the middle of baseball and soccer as far as professional leagues are concerned, which brought to mind my new favorite baseball team: the Savannah Bananas.

Things were not going well for the Savannah baseball team in 2015. They had abysmal attendance, they were

out of money, and their historic baseball stadium was in disrepair. Along came a new owner, who began to reimagine how baseball could involve the community.

The community submitted new names for the team, and the imagination of the owner took hold. He proposed all sorts of ways for the community to get involved, from a senior citizen dance team called The Banana Nanas to a "Dad-Bod Cheerleading Squad" called the Man-Nanas. And the fun extended to the players, who sometimes wear kilts and learn choreographed dances for between-innings entertainment. But it didn't stop with the players and the fans: the coaching staff includes a luchador, a nine-year-old and a grandma.

It wasn't just the activities surrounding the game either. They have changed up some of the rules of the game itself, including making each inning a game in itself where one team will "win" the inning and score a point (first team to 5 points wins the whole game). They have a 2-hour limit on games. If you step out of the batter box, it's a strike, batters can steal 1st base and if a fan catches a foul ball, the player is out! (you can read more at thesavannahbananas.com)

Questions swirl in my mind: Is this really baseball and who makes that determination? How does this sense of playfulness help? Where can we all gain a sense of playfulness in our lives again?

I feel that as we begin to imagine what life looks like in this stage of the pandemic, we deal with questions about how many vaccines administered will make it safe enough for us and how we can begin to see other people not as potential disease carriers but as human beings, friends, neighbors and children of God as well as the questions of how we navigate these waters for people who depend on us, like older people or vulnerable people or kids. And there are the questions about what that means for our life together—our worship, our work and our ministries.

I wonder if a sense of playfulness can help us. I wonder if a sense of watching God at work in different ways might awaken us to God's own playfulness. I wonder if we can reimagine what it means to be a community of grace, even if that looks a little different than "before". I have a hope that our playfulness in the coming months and years might allow us to be the people God has always been creating us to be...and to be those who know what it means to allow our elders to greet us and our children to play among us in the sight of God and in ways which care for all.


