

Austin's CROP Hunger Walk is Sunday, March 1, 2020, at Camp Mabry. I'm excited about 2 new additions to the Walk day activities: Tiny Tails petting zoo (which, let's face it, gives adults an excuse to act like kids again!) and the Ukelele Society of Austin will have provide music! Walk activities start at 2 pm and Step-off is at 2:30 pm.

I hope to see a walking team from Memorial that day. Come out and listen to the music; enjoy the education tables and the walk route. Mabry is very hospitable – our walking route takes us into some wooded and shady areas.

Last Fall, several of my colleagues visited St. Andrew's Refugee Ministries (StARS) in Cairo, Egypt. Church World Service, often because of the funds raised through CROP Hunger Walks, has been a longterm partner with St. Andrew's. It's difficult to sum up in a few words the impact of StARS. But please know that StARS is a family of primarily refugee staff (about 85%) who are doing everything they can to help their neighbors. As the number of refugees in Cairo continues to climb, particularly unaccompanied refugee children and youth, StARS is growing, too. They provide nearly every service you can think of, from a foster care system to legal support to schools and adult education to rent assistance to medical support to vocational training to just having a safe place to spend time. We heard over and over again that StARS is a family for refugees who have lost theirs, and an oasis in the desert. Here's a video that tells part of the story.

A life changed

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:2)

On January 3, The United Methodist Church made a splash in national (and international!) media when our Council of Bishops announced that a proposal to divide the denomination had been negotiated.

Headlines screamed, "United Methodist Church Announces Plan to Split Over Same Sex Marriage" (NY Times), "Methodists Agree on Compromise to Split Denomination" (Christianity Today), "United Methodist Church Plans to Divide Over Differences in LGBTQ Beliefs" (NPR). Most of them made it sound like a "done deal" and that we would soon need to take a congregational vote over where to end up. The truth is that we are not nearly there yet, and many things have yet to be decided.

I am grateful many of you sought me out to directly address your hopes and fears about all that you had been hearing. Most of you are also aware that we have people in our congregation who are on all sides of any given argument! Sometimes our hopes and fears about the church and its position on any given topic align with our political views, and we take our cues from the nature of politics now—that we cannot live and work alongside those who do not share our views. Sometimes we point out where scripture "agrees" with us, but avoid or forget the places that challenge our viewpoints.

One thing we need to remember is that The United Methodist Church is no stranger to either arguments or division. In fact, the UMC is only 50 years old, the result of a merger between the Evangelical United Brethren (from whence we get "United") and The Methodist Church (from whence we get "Methodist"). And The Methodist Church was the result of a 1939 merger between The Methodist Episcopal Church (which had been the original group founded in 1784), the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (which had split away from the MEC in 1844 over the right to own slaves), and The Methodist Protestant Church. Other groups split off from the original MEC over various issues like the Free Methodist Church, the African Methodist Episcopal Church, and The Wesleyan Methodist Church.

But in the present moment, Memorial United Methodist Church is a part of a denomination that is examining its future and finding that division may be necessary. The Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation that was released on January 3 has some key support, but in reality, it is only one of several plans or processes that will be coming before our General Conference this May. The General Conference is the ONLY body that can speak or enact legislation for the entire United Methodist Church. As these plans are discussed (and legislation for the Protocol is written and released), I will be hosting informational sessions so that we can discuss the potential impact of legislation both on the denomination and on Memorial UMC. Those conversations will be structured so that we can examine both the issues behind the legislation and the potential legislation itself.

But even before then we have an opportunity to stay in conversation. We are in conversation with God, with scripture, with each other, and with those who are most impacted by our witness out in the rest of the world. In this day and age, what might it mean to renew your mind? What spiritual practices keep you centered on Jesus? How is God transforming YOU before God uses you to transform the world that God so loves?

I have great hope for the people called Methodists, no matter what happens to a denomination or an individual church. I pray that, as God has for almost two and a half centuries, God will continue to bring about a thirst for holiness and a love for neighbor in you, through the renewing of your mind.
