Robert C. "Bob" Hauser

passed peacefully at his home surrounded by his family on December 19, 2021 in Pflugerville, Texas. Bob was born on November 24, 1934 in Denison, Texas. His parents were Milton Gilmore Hauser and Lelia Baker Hauser. The 5th of 6 children, Bob was the last surviving of his siblings: Ellenor Fulton, Janet Luibel, Doris Hussey, Milton G. "Sonny" Hauser and Mary "Vann" McCrary.

As a little boy, Bob's life-long love for the outdoors began. Hunting, fishing, camping, woodworking, and sports became his life. At age 11, he had his first job at Ashburn's Ice Cream making 5 cents an hour.

Bob graduated from Denison High School and enlisted immediately in the US Navy at the age of 17. While serving in the Korean Conflict from 1952-1955, Bob was awarded several awards. He was honorably discharged at the age of 21.

After his Naval service, he married the love of his life Norma Ann Byrd on March 3, 1956. Bob and Norma enjoyed their time together "before kids" traveling, camping, water skiing, sports, LIFE.

In 1963, Bob & Norma were blessed with their 1st child, Reggie. Dad was hired by the City of Denison code enforcement which led to his career with Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. After the birth of their 2nd child Robin Ann, they moved briefly to Possum Kingdom State Park, then to San Angelo. In 1971, TPWD transferred dad to Headquarters in Austin where they settled to raise their family. Upon the move, they were blessed with their 3rd child, Ruth Ellen.

Throughout raising their children, the family were members of Memorial United Methodist Church-Austin. Many years of dedicated volunteer work and maintenance with Delwood Northeast Optimist Club. Bob retired from TPWD at the age of 75 where he was Chief of Park Operations. One of his proudest projects was the Wildlife Expo. After a few weeks of "retirement", Bob traveled all over Texas to help FEMA with true dedication and commitment until retiring to become a full-time grandpa.

Dad's only Christmas wish was to be in Heaven with Norma.

Services were directed by Beck Funeral Home, Pflugerville Texas. Celebration of Life was held on Saturday, January 8th, 2022 at 1:00 pm, Pflugerville Community Church. In lieu of flowers, donations made be made to Hospice Austin in Bob's honor.

<u>Philip N. Lowe</u> died on January 5, 2022. He was 98 years old, with a golden heart and a wealth of stories.

He grew up in Mart, Texas, on a dairy farm in a large, hard-working family. He remembered when electricity came to the farm in the late 1920s. He recalled having mixed feelings about childhood birthdays, because "every year they gave you another cow to milk!" A former Mart football player with his brother Robert, Philip was a lifelong Panther fan. World War II broke out a short time after he began higher education at Texas A&M, and he entered pilot training. He married his high school sweetheart, Audrey, and they moved 13 times during the war.

After the war, they raised two children, Mike and Rebecca, in the house on Tilden Street. The Lowes retired to Kingsland, where they hosted many family gatherings in the house on Lake LBJ that Philip designed and finished out. Though Audrey and Philip had some wonderful travel adventures after they retired. She soon had health problems that required him to become her care partner, which he did for more than twenty years.

Philip took great pleasure in family connections and delighted in hearing about his grandchildren's big adventures and daily work. He also reveled in genealogy, tracing family roots to Irish immigrants in the 1630s.

When he was almost ninety, Philip moved to the Austin area, where he enjoyed the company of his daughter Rebecca. He later encouraged and loved her along a five-year cancer journey. To the end of his life, he remained sweet, witty, generous, and insightful.

Philip was a lifelong Methodist and most recently attended Memorial Methodist Church in Austin. A faithful Christian and a believer in eternal life, he is now reunited with his parents, brothers and sisters, Rebecca, and his beloved Audrey.

A small graveside service was held with immediate family. Meanwhile, in lieu of flowers, friends may donate to Lions International in Philip's memory.
