By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. ²⁴ And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit. ²⁶ Let us not become conceited, competing against one another, envying one another.

Galatians 5:22-26

Over the 24 years that I have been working in churches and while in seminary, many people have come to me, wanting to know if they were making a good decision or for guidance on what to do. Many times, I have had a clear understanding of direction on behalf of a person, but sometimes, I find myself wondering the same things that they are wondering: How do I know that what I am doing is right?

Several years ago when I was pondering that question, I happened to have this passage in my devotional reading. It occurred to me that along with scriptures that encourage us to "test the spirits" (1 John 4:1, for example), this comes close to helping me discern as anything I had ever thought about.

At first, I understood the passage to refer to the fruits that were produced in me or the person deciding directly related to those decisions. But more and more prominently, I believe that those are the fruits that are produced in the community where the implications of the decisions take place. Fruit doesn't just grow inside us for us. Fruit grows inside us and is then shown and shared (our "witness") to the rest of our community and world.

Immediately before this passage, Paul does two things—he reminds the Galatians that they have been set free from all of the litmus tests (including circumcision) that people would use to say that they were a Christian. But he also says that freedom from those litmus tests doesn't mean we can do anything and still follow Christ. Among the "works of the flesh", he lists such things as envy, factions, jealousy, quarrels, idolatry and anger. If we look at our communities today, there are churches, households, cities, companies and interest groups that all are powered and motivated by such fruits.

How is the church going to be different? What is the use in being different if it just means we lose out all the time? Won't that let people run over us and take advantage of us?

The answer is possibly...or maybe even probably. Paul says we have crucified the flesh with its desires. Learning to follow Christ, even to the places where we seem weak or soft-hearted, is a part of the discipline of giving up our lives to the redeeming love of Christ.

It also leads us to a place where we don't have to compete for God's love or for the things that we need. It doesn't mean that we are no longer compelled to share the Good News (whether in word or deed)—it simply means that our faithfulness is not a project where there are winners and losers. The fruits of the Spirit are there for us to delight in and to bear witness to those who are still convinced that the works of the flesh are all that matter.

What is your life producing? What happens when you read a newspaper or watch the news? What happens when you make a decision or go to a family outing? Are there litmus tests you still use to decide about people? Or do you look for the fruits of their lives and make decisions about what will produce good fruit in yours?

CWS and Natural Disasters

I recently had a conversation with a pastor in Austin. The pastor asked how Church World Service planned to respond to the devastating volcanic



eruption in Guatemala. My answer, for the moment, was "wait."

Wait? A major disaster – a killing disaster – had taken place and CWS was "waiting"? I had a great conversation with that pastor, and, when kc's note came about the newsletter deadline, I thought I'd share with you about waiting.

To say that CWS is waiting is not to say that CWS is doing nothing. We have a strong partnership with the Council of Evangelical Churches of Guatemala (CIEDEG). Our team works with CIEDEG to strengthen the food security and income-generating activities of 700 members of local indigenous associations.

CIEDEG communities were not, thankfully, directly impacted by the volcanic eruptions. Right now, CIEDEG is in conversations across Guatemala to determine its role in relief efforts. At the point where an action plan is developed, many international organizations – including CWS – will provide assistance.

So, the nutshell is: 1). CWS works in partnership; 2). CWS honors the ability of local people to determine the kind of assistance that makes the most sense; 3). CWS works cooperatively with other international NGOs, through ACT (Action of Churches Together) to make sure each NGO's strength is maximized.


