The Pastor's Corner

"And that special gift of ministry you were given when the leaders of the church laid hands on you and prayed—keep that dusted off and in use." (1 Timothy 4:14—The Message paraphrase)

I was grateful that Victoria Schwarz invited me to be one of the previously-ordained people who was among the company of those who laid hands on her as the bishop ordained her last week at Annual Conference. It is the fourth time I have been asked to be a part of the celebration for someone, and it always helps me remember my own journey to ordination.

I first heard my own call to ministry when I was in college, fumbling a bit for a major in the midst of discovering that I really didn't like math as much as I liked numbers. But I kept being excited about what I was learning in my Bible study and serving in the campus ministry I belonged to, and I was discovering that my academic interests were aligning with serving in a church.

After college, I worked as a music and youth director for three years while that call continued to be refined. Pastors and other church leaders gave me opportunities to explore that call, and my years in seminary made me certain that I was called to the ministry of an elder—to Word (preaching and teaching), to Sacrament (presiding over baptism and communion), to Order (helping to structure the church for ministry and mission) and to Service (everything from missions to pastoral care). My call was affirmed by my professors, through my years of service as a Probationary (now Provisional) Elder and through many pages of written ordination papers and interviews.

And after all of that, I knelt there in an auditorium and Bishop Martinez put his hands on my head, the hands of Rev. Dr. Amy Laura Hall and my dad, Rev. Kent Kepler on my back as well as a few others who had joined us on stage. People in the gathered congregation who knew me stood as well, some reaching out their own hands. I felt all of them.

I still do. Part of what makes me so happy to work with people on their own callings, whether it is to the life-long ministry of one who is ordained or someone who is called to particular tasks while remaining a lay person, is that it reminds me that God keeps gifting each and every one of us, no matter what age or stage or our lives we are in.

When I remember the feeling of those hands on my head and shoulders, the ones reaching out to me, and when I have an opportunity to place my own hand on someone as I am helping with an ordination or confirmation or baptism, I am reminded of all of those who have affirmed areas where the Spirit has particularly moved in my life. The places where something in me sparked, and others recognized it and made sure I recognized it too.

Where is it that the Spirit has sparked for you? Where have you seen the Spirit spark in others? What can we do to keep those places "dusted off and in use"? What moments of joy and connection to God help you to continue serving when you remember them?

Two Too Many” A Picture Give Away

Do you remember?

TRAFCO: stands for Television Radio and Films Commission, a branch of the Methodist Board of Education

1966– TRAFCO and Canadian Baptists jointly supported a new Christian radio station in Bolivia.

1968– TRAFCO and American Jewish Committee sponsored a radio show called “Might Call”. It was broadcast on KUT-FM (98.7MC) Listeners could call in with questions and comments.

1969– TRAFCO sponsored a radio show called “Protestant Hour”. It features guest stars like Bill Mann and Norma Zimmer of the Lawrence Welk Show and broadcast on KNOW.



October 1962 our church newsletter encouraged the children grade 4-6 to watch a new show called Breakthru. It took six years to develop the thirteen half hour program. It made the Austin newspaper and was promoted by Christian Educational Committee.

The first guest *star* was Patty Duke!

1960’s– a show called “Light Time” was created for 8 -12 year olds, found on channel 6 and 9 and also, recommended by TRAFCO.

1967– Southern Texas conference Methodist Church encouraged people to watch “God and Man” a TV special on channel 9.

1970-TRAFCO encouraged people to watch a four part mini series on the Sermon on the Mount on NBC.

Methodist Sponsored Publications

Motive 1941-1972 Motive was a Methodist Student/Religious Activist magazine with strong political views on civil rights, Vietnam and emerging gender issues. Example articles: May 1942 “Mr. Roosevelt, Dr. Dykstra and Alternate Service” 1971, “The King and the Donkey”. Time magazine stated “It (Motive magazine) stood out among the church publications like a mini-skirt at a church social.” Also, in 1965 it was runner up to Life magazine. Together 1956-1973 In 1962 our church newsletter encouraged members to subscribe to the magazine, which focused on family and church topics. Examples of articles: “Must Small Churches Close Their Doors?”, 1966, “Mount United College Around the World Choir Tour”, “Boat Safety” and “Worship in National Parks?”.

Twelve Fifteen—1952-1964 Sponsored by the Methodist Board of Education, written for ages 12-15. These short stories range from religious, biographies, history, adventure and modern topics. It asked its readers to send in their own short stories about their future goals, hobbies, how they made extra money, poems and drawings. Articles sent in on topics like interior decorating, doll making, aviation and candle making were entered into a monthly contest and the winner won \$3.00!



Central Methodist Churchman 1952-1953 Our church published the Central Methodist Churchman with articles like “An Island Saved by a Bible” and “what Methodism Stands For”. Also our pastor Dr. Will-Matthis Dunn wrote articles as did his father Rev. Sidney Sullom Dunn. We have found “Historical Issue: May 1953” and only 8 others, but are still looking.

Current publications now available in the Narthex include:

Sunshine and Good News magazines.



Sunshine is over 100 years old, published by students of the Methodist Home. In 1926 they purchased a printing press that lasted until 1972!

Good News started in 1967–present. It is a classical evangelical witness and ministry for the renewal & reform within the UMC. In Other words: What’s happening in the world wide community of the Methodist Church
