# The Pastor's Corner

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, <sup>2</sup> make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. <sup>3</sup> Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. <sup>4</sup> Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. (Philippians 2:1-4)

One of the joys of Central Texas is the sheer variety of insects it is possible to come in contact with—and even learn from! A few years ago, I was in our driveway when I saw a long line of ants, marching in two different directions, half of them carrying leaves back to a mound



that was just starting to form off of our carport. They were fascinating with the way they seemed to communicate and work together.

I am less fascinated now. It seems that this particular variety of ant is pretty much immune to a lot of insecticides or ways to control the population that has exploded around our house. Working together, they can strip a flowering tree of its bright leaves within days, leaving a trail of pink and red blossoms along with a small mound of them to mark the entrance to their lair.

So when a friend posted a message that talked about an encounter she had with them in a nature preserve, talking about how they reminded her that we are made to work in community, I was reminded that there are many perspectives and ways to see how nature functions around me. It is possible that in that preserve, they are a vital part of the ecosystem!

But then my friend, Kevin Murphy also commented on that message. His own perspective reminded me of something vital—something that this passage from Philippians talks about. He said, "My take: these little suckers are incredible and if the only lesson is unity of purpose and working together, they are a great example. What's missing is that they are driven without regard to anything or anyone else around them. I think of Robert Moses, the architect of mid-20<sup>th</sup> Century NY. He was the master builder—highways, expressways, bridges, parks and tunnels. Laser-focused but with no regard for the consequences imposed on hundreds of thousands of people and thousands of communities. We are at our best when we have purpose and skill and mutual regard for how our actions impact others."

Both of my friends reminded me of the truth of this passage from Philippians, which contains both the admonition to the community to work together—to "be of full accord and of one mind" AND to look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others.

Everyone can point to the divisions in our society, our politics, the Church. If we are faithful to our gospel call, we have long and hard work ahead of us to speak with each other and listen to one another in order to understand and discern God's hope for us, to move together through confession, repentance, forgiveness and celebration.

We *will* all need to work together in those places. We *will* need to remember that everyone has a gift to bring to the picture and everyone can contribute.

But we will also need to realize that not all single-minded working together is for the good of others. This pandemic has shown me over and over again that our greatest gift is to do things that don't just care for ourselves, but to do things we wouldn't normally do in order to care for others. We balance our own needs with the needs of others and try to make sure that we are working together, especially taking into account one another's vulnerabilities.

God has given us the gift of community, and God has asked us to use that gift for the sake of others. Thanks be to God.

Even better – Church World Service (CWS) grants have been sent to the local hunger-fighting partners supported by the event: the Central Texas Food Bank, Casa Marianella, Hope Food Pantry, i-ACT's For Refugees Program, Urban Roots, Mt. Olive Baptist Church Food Pantry,	I also want to celebrate with you that CWS has received a 4-Star rating from Charity Navigator – CN's highest rating. There are several components to CN's ratings. The one component I want to highlight with you is that CWS received a rating of 97% in the area of Accountability. As a staff person, this warms my heart.
