

Christine Garner graduated from the University of Texas at Austin with a Bachelor of Architecture (B.Arch.) and a Minor in Business on May 6th.


In 2021, she spent 5 months studying abroad in Copenhagen and in 2022, she completed a 6 month residency at an




based near UT that we have supported for years.



1874 – The first couple married by Pastor C. Charnquist, was Lars Johan Lindahl to Mathilda Kristina in the Swedish Methodist Church in Austin, TX. (Note: Lars Lindahl died in 1881)

1893 - The marriage license of Frans Oscar Linden to Jennie Otelia Dahlin on Dec. 20 by Pastor N. Eklund of Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church. (Wedding & License pictured below). Jennie Sanders, Betty Sanders daughter, was named after both of her great grandmothers.



1942—A Tom Thumb wedding (pictured below), also call a miniature wedding, is a pageant were the children act out the marriage ceremony. It was popular in 1900’s, inspired by 1863 wedding between Charles Stratton and Lavinia Warren. Both were no more than three feet tall. He was a comedian and an all- around entertainer, she was a silent film star. They met P. T. Barnum, he changed Charles’ name to Tom Thumb. Barnum made it a grand event, selling wedding tickets to the public. The couple was invited to the White House by President Lincoln. They toured the world with P. T. Barnum.



The event made the Austin-American Statesman, May 31, 1942. Article title “Tom Thumb Wedding” Hosted by Woman’s Society of Christian Service of Central Methodist Church. The program was open to the public with a reception that followed. Rev. Howe’s granddaughter, Elfieda Marko, was listed as a guest.
 Note: Rev. Howe was the eighth pastor to service this congregation.



In 1884 the Woman's Missionary Society Evangelical Association divided into two groups: Woman's Missionary Society and the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society. Then in 1922 came back together as Woman's Missionary Society.

In 1910 two groups of Methodist Woman joined together to form Woman's Missionary Council.

1878- Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

1890- Woman's Home Missionary Society

In 1939 the groups of Methodist Woman joined together to form Woman's Society of Christian Service Wesleyan Service Guild.

1869-Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (Methodist Episcopal Church)

1879- Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (Methodist Episcopal Church, South)

1880-Woman's Home Missionary Society (Methodist Episcopal Church)

1893- Woman's Home Missionary Society (Methodist Protestant)



In 1946 these two groups of Methodist Woman's groups joined together to form Women Society of World Service.





1875- Women's Missionary Association

The Pastor's Corner

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:6-7

I have tried for weeks now to come up with an appropriate verse to share with you to sum up the last 12 years. It's strange to think about packing and moving to Kingsville when I have become so deeply embedded in this community. But—the transition has started, and moving day is June 28.

I said in my announcement letter that I am grateful for all the ways God has worked through our time—that I am certain that there have been seeds sown which will continue to bear fruit both in the congregation and in the mission field. And I will admit that I am anxious.

I am anxious that I will leave well. I am anxious that I will arrive in the new place well. I am anxious about being farther away from family members who we will need to continue to care for. I am anxious for how I will prepare this congregation to receive their new pastor and that I will give that person what they need to provide continuity of pastoral leadership, especially since they will be part-time. And that June 28 date looms as a hard deadline.

As of June 28, I will no longer be able to say what I've said almost every single Sunday in the streaming service—that it is my privilege to serve as a pastor in the Northeast area of Austin, helping to lead the congregation at Memorial. With my last Sunday in the pulpit being June 4, I've tried to leave room for some administrative details as well as some individual visiting with you all before June 28, even if I'm not in worship.

Anxiety is not something that only the pastor goes through. I'm sure many of you are anxious too—about what the new pastor will be like, about whether you will like them, about whether they will like you. And you may be anxious too that the change isn't happening soon enough for you!

And it's quite potentially possible that your new pastor (whoever they may be) will also be feeling some anxiety about whether or not they will be able to find everything they need or whether they will step into situations and say something hurtful or whether they will get some details wrong. They may be anxious about what it means to be a part-time person in a congregation and property that has never experienced that before.

So if everyone is anxious in this situation, perhaps the greatest thing we could be doing right now is offering one another grace. And praying for one another, especially giving thanks for one another and finding words and actions that convey that thanksgiving! There are not enough words for me to show you everything that is in my heart, so I will give it to God and trust that what I do manage to say will convey in any small part to you all the deep deep love of God whose depths we cannot plumb but surrounds each of us every single day no matter where we are.


And we continue to talk about Good News. Because the Good News is for moments of great joy and celebration as much as it is for moments of anxiousness and release.

And we pastors are all asked, when we leave a place to the next person (whether we are moving or retiring), to really make sure that person is allowed to be the person you look to. Our system asks that we not return to the places we have been for moments of pastoral care or celebration. And that may be hard on all of us, but it's even harder when the new pastor feels excluded from learning who you are and how you grieve and celebrate because you still are calling on a previous pastor to do that with you.

That being said, please trust that I will never stop praying for you. There are still former congregants who I remember with thanksgiving in my prayers! You all will be among them. For all that has been, thanks. For all that will be, praise!
