

passed away on September 23, 2019. She was born in Granger, Texas on December 2, 1930. The youngest of four girls, Charlyne had many happy memories of her childhood in Granger and the surrounding area. She met her husband, Howard Schmidt, in Taylor, TX. Although married for only 20 years, those were very busy years for her. She had 6 children in 8 years, supported Howard from his days as a milkman to an extremely successful career as a realtor. They designed and built a beautiful house which was her lifelong home and the site for many family gatherings and celebrations, and always the hub of the family. We were blessed that Mom was able to remain in her home through her final days. Throughout her life, she was known as Charlyne, Charlie, China, Mom, Mama and Mimi.

She worked at the Internal Revenue Service for 27 years, during which time she received several awards for outstanding service and retired in December 2000. She volunteered at Seton Hospital as a Candy Striper for many years as well as many women's groups associated with Real Estate and the Northeast Austin neighborhood. She was a member of Memorial United Methodist Church for over 60 years. She loved Jesus dearly and read her Bible every day. She was the true essence of a Christian woman, displaying love and forgiveness.

She always loved to be active and busy. She loved to work in her yard, planting flowers and maintaining her lovely cactus garden. She loved to sing and have music playing, humming and singing along with songs while she did her chores. PASTOR'S CORNER

Then he told them a parable: "Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near." Luke 21:29-31

I am unclear what season it is.

It's football season, but it's also the beginnings of basketball season, and we're still, by the way, playing baseball (Go Astros!), and hockey has started. Not to mention that soccer seems to go year round.

The calendar says we are in the season of fall, but the weather certainly isn't taking note of that.

Also—our fig trees at the church? Yeah, with the way they sprout leaves (and figs!), it's ALWAYS summer here in South Texas.

And it's also always election season, but that's a whole other article.

Going deeper, some may be in a season of grief, where loss piles up around us, like the falling leaves that we normally see this time of year. Almost all of us are in a season of change, where the status quo of our lives is quickly becoming impossible to maintain. And it is also possible that you may be in a season of hope where you see amazing and wonderful things on the horizon, getting closer and closer every day.

The church calendar says that we're in a season of ordinary time with Advent coming soon. You can tell that only because our banners are green, but usually those seasons don't make a whole lot of difference in our everyday lives.

On the other hand, the United Methodist calendar says that it's Charge Conference season, which means meetings and reports and compiling data and filling out forms. Some of you can expect to be lots more busy because of this season in the church—I know I will be!

At Memorial UMC in particular, we're about to enter a season in which we talk about stewardship, which always seems a touchy subject, except Jesus talked a whole lot about the way we take care of and use money, the earth and the things we call "our own". To him, learning about stewardship and what God expects had EVERYTHING to do with what we think of God and what we think of God's hopes for this world. It also had to do with how we think about each other and how we treat each other, so this is a very important time to pay attention, not to what the church needs, but to what you need in order to have a good relationship with God and God's kingdom.

And it's that last season that gives me pause. The verse I referenced above is small little simile/ parable—part of Jesus' longer teaching on the signs of his coming again. Even though he said over and over again that we won't know when it's going to come, he seems to imply here that there is always something we can be learning, no matter the season.

It all asks us what kind of people we wish to be in this interim. It asks us if we have paid any attention to what Jesus has been asking us to remember. It asks us if we could justify that hateful word we said or that racist comment we laughed at or that lie that served us at the time but still bore false witness against another human being. It asks us if we are truly loving God with heart, soul, mind and strength and our neighbor as self...or if people are just to be used and commodified and turned into legal problems.

And so for us, it is a season of learning—always. Learning the hope that Jesus brings, learning the peace that forgiveness imparts, and learning the love that daily, Daily, DAILY we need to put into practice. May you be recipients and practitioners both.
