Annie Katheryn "Kay" Allen died September 13, 2016 in Austin, Texas. She was born in 1919 in Hattiesburg, Mississippi to Clute Bernard Hixon and Kate Baldwin Perkins.

Kay attended nursing school at the Methodist Hospital in Dallas, Texas. During World War II, the Armed Forces needed nurses, and Kay answered that call, joining the Army. After finishing school, she receiving the rank of Second Lieutenant in 1945 and served as a nurse during the war in Europe.

Her two years in the military in Germany and France were filled with hard work and occasional R&R. It was on leave that she met Lt. Robert C. Allen who was also on leave. Bob was quite the dancer, and she was "swept off her feet." They were married in 1947 in Nevada, then moved to San Francisco, where she gave birth to a daughter, Mary, and a son, Robert.

Bob served his country on a series of assignments which included Korea, Washington, Germany, Georgia, Vietnam, North Carolina and Texas. Kay and the kids traveled along when possible, taking frequent car trips to enjoy new places, foods, and cultures.

After Bob retired, they used Austin as a home base while taking long trips in an Airstream Trailer. Kay enjoyed patio gardening, involvement in local and ex-military clubs, and her church. She had fun with her granddaughters, Jennie and Erin, having silly costume tea parties, and letting them take turns being "Queen for a Day". They called her "Tutu" which is grandmother in Hawaiian.

Kay received an Army Occupation Medal, a WWII Victory Medal and her name is on a WWII memorial in Washington, D.C. She was honored to be included on an Honor Flight trip with other veterans a couple years ago, where she was able to view the memorial in person.

Kay's generosity, friendship and sense of humor will be missed. She said, "The Lord has taken care of me, and has done a pretty good job." She trusted Him for what comes next.

Kay is survived by her daughter Mary Allen Crook and husband, Jim; son Robert Emmett Allen and wife Patti Beerwinkle-Allen; granddaughters Jennie Kathleen Fleury and husband Brad; Erin Michelle Huddleston and husband Dave; and great grandchildren Lucas and Audrey Huddleston and Samuel Fleury.

Interment was at 10:45 a.m. at Ft. Sam Houston, 1520 Harry Wurzbach Rd. in San Antonio on Tuesday, September 20.

How can National Breast Cancer Awareness Month make a difference?

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a chance to raise awareness about the importance of early detection of breast cancer. Make a difference! Spread the word about mammograms and encourage

communities, organizations, families, and individuals to aet involved.

Here are just a few ideas:

- Ask doctors and nurses to speak to women about the importance of getting screened for breast cancer.
- Encourage women ages 40 to 49 to talk with their doctors about when to start getting mammograms.
- Organize an event to talk with women ages 50 to 74 in your community about getting mammograms every 2 years.

The good news is that many women can survive breast cancer if it's found and treated early. A mammogram – the screening test for breast cancer – can help find breast cancer early when it's easier to treat.

our lives. Though we are no longer a primarily agricultural civilization (at least far fewer of us are involved in the produce of the bulk of our food), it is still important to note that

righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God. Philippians 1:9-12

The pecan trees both at the church and at the parsonage are full of ripening pecans. Last year, there were very few nuts, but this year, the branches hang heavy. Quite coincidentally, I'm sure, the population of squirrels at the parsonage has increased exponentially!

I was thinking about the harvest of pecans that I dream about and never get around to. Most often, the pecans in my yard are picked up by said squirrels or by folks who come by and ask (or sometimes don't) if they can have the pecans. While I always prefer that they ask, I just want to see them eaten, so I generally don't mind who gets them as long as they don't just rot on the tree or on the ground.

Fall is the season when we start taking inventory of the fruit that has been produced by a church in any given year. We talk about it at our Charge Conference, and we use those stories and that data to make plans for the next year.

Some years the fruit doesn't seem as identifiable—like a drought year for a pecan crop. Some years we are burdened by a great crop—too much for us to sustain on our own! Whatever happens, we thank God for the growth that has happened within our congregation and within our mission field in the past year.

But harvests also call to mind other aspects of work in a congregation. The pecan tree outside our sanctuary was planted as a Boy Scout project by Hildegard Kothman-Cook's son, who died a few years ago. Yet what he planted continues to give life to the neighborhood. The scriptures call for those who own land to allow for the edges of the land to be gleaned by those in need—and it was during the gleaning that Ruth and Boaz began the relationship that 3 generations later produced King David.

The harvest is interwoven into our scriptures and into

God continues to grow that which we plant.

Which begs the question—what are we planting? What do we hope will grow in this neighborhood? What work are we doing to tend and nurture the love of Jesus Christ for our neighbors? What are we planting in the lives of our childen—and not just the children to whom we are related, but the children in our schools and down the street? Are we planting hope there...or are we planting a sense that only some kids will be good enough?

Though we tend to only take stock of what we've harvested once a year, I suggest that we take daily and weekly stock of what we've been planting. That heartfelt interaction with a coworker might just have planted love. The way in which you dismissed someone's concerns might have planted despair. Though we can't plant perfectly, we can keep on asking the Lord of the Harvest to help us plant things that are worthy of the righteousness that comes through Jesus. See you in worship!
